Explore the best of Death Valley and Joshua Tree on this carefully orchestrated itinerary led by an NPCA expert and naturalist guides. These amazing Southern California national parks offer incredible fall trekking across diverse and mesmerizing landscapes. Experience two large desert parks that NPCA helped to establish, Sand to Snow and Mojave Trails National Monuments, with a behind-the-scenes look at how NPCA works with local partners to protect these valuable places. Have a formidable visit at Manzanar National Historic Site, an off-the-beaten-path park that preserves one of 10 American incarceration camps where more than 120,000 Japanese Americans were held for years against their will during World War II. Throughout the trip, you'll discover a plethora of desert phenomena, including lush oases, vast sand dunes, towering granite monoliths, salt flats, badlands, alpine peaks and more! Keep a sharp eye out for desert wildlife with opportunities to see desert bighorn sheep, desert cottontail rabbits, roadrunners, desert reptiles, coyotes and snakes. This tour offers a cornucopia of experiences in America's stunning Mojave Desert with an inside look at the various threats this ecosystem faces and how NPCA helps to protect it. Each night we'll retire to comfortable accommodations that put us close to the action.

ITINERARY

DAY Palm Springs Welcome Reception



Arrive in Palm Springs, California, where you will meet with the group at the hotel at 5:00 p.m. for a welcome reception, orientation and dinner with your guides and NPCA host. Learn about some of the key NPCA initiatives related to the itinerary and prepare for a week of hiking, learning and adventure! Guests are responsible for local transportation to the hotel. DAY Sand to Snow National Monument



Today, we depart from Palm Springs and head to Sand to Snow National Monument, which NPCA helped to establish in 2016. This national monument gets its name from the area's extreme elevation change—from the sand of the Sonoran Desert to the peak of San Gorgonio Mountain, a difference of about 10,000 feet. Sand to Snow is home to the most botanically diverse mountains in the contiguous United States and provides a critical water source for many of Joshua Tree National Park's desert bighorn sheep. We'll enjoy a short hike in the monument and then continue on to Joshua Tree National Park for check-in and dinner. 29 Palms Hotel (B, L, D)

DAY Joshua Tree National Park

3 Today, we explore the wonders of Joshua Tree National Park. This popular park is best known for its namesake yucca plant, but its landscape is dominated by enormous, intricately shaped granite rock formations. After a delightful breakfast, our first hike today will loop us through Barker Dam. This valley is rich with petroglyphs and lush with plant life thanks to the precious reservoir created by the dam. It also carries with it the tall tales from the days of gold mining and cattlemen. We'll then embark on a journey into another portion of the famed Maze at the Wonderland of Rocks. This trail will weave us through a jungle of spires, granite monoliths and impressive rock formations, opening up to tantalize us with breathtaking views of the park. Get an in-depth look at how NPCA addresses the compromised air quality and diminished views in the park, mostly due to the agriculture industry in the San Joaquin Valley—one of the most polluted areas in the nation. 29 Palms Hotel (B, L, D)

DAY Mojave Trails National Monument

4 After breakfast this morning, we'll say goodbye to Joshua Tree and move on to Mojave Trails National Monument. Mojave Trails connects Joshua Tree National Park to Mojave National Preserve, creating a large natural corridor and living landscape. We will stop for a hike at Bonanza Springs and discover firsthand the important role NPCA played in preventing the development of the **Cadiz pipeline**, a water-mining project advocates prevented from being built across this fragile desert landscape. We'll also meet with NPCA's local partners in the park to learn about wildlife conservation efforts and the protection of endangered species such as the desert tortoise. Then we'll continue on our journey to **Death** Valley National Park for check-in and dinner. Death Valley Oasis Inn or The Ranch at Death Valley(B, L, D)

DAY Death Valley National Park

After a quick stop at the Furnace Creek Visitor Center, we'll head to the trailhead of Golden Canyon and Gower **Gulch**, a classic Death Valley hiking loop that takes us deep into a labyrinth of golden-colored hills and winding narrow canyons that make up the Badlands of the Amargosa Mountains. After a hilltop lunch with panoramic views, we'll hike down into the water-carved Gower Gulch, spilling out onto a slanted desert landscape at the edge of Death Valley itself. This evening, we will take a drive after dinner to the Badwater Basin for expansive night-sky viewing. Death Valley offers some of the best stargazing in America and is designated a **Gold Tier** Dark Sky Park, the darkest possible rating. MANZANAR NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE, California

DAY Death Valley and Manzanar National Historic Site

Getting an early start today, we'll enjoy sunrise at the Mesquite Sand Dunes. After breakfast and ample photography opportunities, we'll continue west and hike to Darwin Falls, a mesmerizing Death Valley oasis situated at a higher elevation in the park. After Darwin Falls, we'll make our way to Manzanar National Historic Site for a cultural tour of this fascinating World War II Japanese incarceration camp. Sue Kunitomi Embrey, a woman who was incarcerated at the camp during the war, helped plan annual pilgrimages to Manzanar and spearheaded a campaign to designate it as a national historic site. NPCA and National Park Service staff will help the group imagine what life was like behind the barbed wire fences of this camp and discuss the lives of Embrey and others who ensure these stories continue to be told for generations to come. After the tour of Manzanar, the group will eventually make its way back to our Death Valley lodging, eating dinner en route or back at the ranch, depending on timing. DAY Sunrise in Death Valley and Afternoon Departures

Sunrise at Zabriskie Point before departures to Las Vegas, NV for an airport transfer to McCarran International Airport (LAS). (B, L)

Set along Highway 190 next to the National Park Service Visitor Center, you can enjoy a classic town square with towering date palms and mission California architecture.
