
Inclusions: Four nights accommodations aboard ship; all meals and nonalcoholic beverages aboard ship; shore excursions; sightseeing and entrance fees; special access permits and park fees; use of kayaks and paddleboards; taxes and service charges; and services of the Lindblad Expeditions' natural history staff.

Exclusions: Air transportation; transfers from airport upon arrival or departure; passport or visa fees, if necessary; meals not indicated; travel protection plan; optional diving excursions; personal items such as Wi-Fi, laundry, spa treatments, alcohol, etc.; and gratuities to the ship's crew, which are at your discretion.

Known by some as North America's Galápagos, the Channel Islands and their surrounding waters provide habitat for more than 2,000 species of plants and animals, including 150 species found nowhere else in the world. These islands are so significant that they were first protected as a national monument in 1938 and later became a national park in 1980. Get away for a revitalizing experience of wildness and wellness. Travel aboard the National Geographic Venture, your floating base camp, and sail to this picturesque destination. We'll actively explore three of the five wildlife-rich islands which make up the Channel Islands National Park, plus beautiful nearby Catalina Island. On this exhilarating voyage, you'll hike in a rare grove of Torrey pines, paddle through impressive sea caves, and marvel at architectural gems, all the while having the ability to set your own pace for recreation or relaxation in this unmarred landscape. All activities are facilitated by naturalist guides and other experts, including an NPCA staff host who will give in-depth information on NPCA's important role in the history of the park. You'll discover how NPCA helped to remove ranching and hunting operations on Santa Rosa Island, allowing native species to flourish and providing the public with unhindered access to this beautifully isolated place.


DAY Los Angeles / Embark



Embark on the *National Geographic Venture* in the early evening — where you'll meet the team and settle in for the days ahead! (D)

DAY Anacapa and Santa Cruz Islands, Channel Islands National Park

Wake to the gentle motion of the ship at anchor off the rocky outcropping of East Anacapa Island. Join your fitness instructor on the sun deck for morning yoga before heeding the call of the breakfast buffet. After breakfast, join naturalists aboard our expedition landing craft to go ashore on East Anacapa. Enjoy a scenic hike to **Inspiration Point** to soak in the views, take photos of **Anacapa Lighthouse**, built in 1912, and the last major light station to be built on the West Coast. Or, for a more relaxing option, explore Arch Rock via Zodiac, a rugged yet comfortable small watercraft that can land almost anywhere. (B,L,D)



DAY Santa Rosa Island, Channel 3 Islands National Park

Kick-start your morning with a stretch class before breakfast. Weather permitting, go kayaking, hike one of the many trails, or simply relax ashore enjoying the bird life or watching for the small, endemic Channel Island fox. Join our naturalists for a more strenuous hike out to the base of the island's **Torrey pines**, one of the world's rarest pines, and one of only two naturally occurring groves in the world. End the day with a sunset cocktail party. (B, L, D)

DAY Santa Catalina Island

Spend the day discovering the colorful history and natural wonders of Santa Catalina Island. Once a haunt of smugglers and gold-diggers, the island was transformed into a resort destination by chewing gum tycoon William Wrigley Jr. in the 1920s. Some 50 years later, heirs Philip K. Wrigley and Dorothy Wrigley Offield established the Catalina Island Conservancy, protecting nearly 90% of the island.

After a morning workout on deck followed by breakfast, enjoy a brief introduction by a conservancy member to learn about their work on the island before heading out on the trail for spectacular views of the coastline and the Catalina backcountry. With luck, we may catch a glimpse or a photo—of the bison herd who have resided on Santa Catalina Island since 1924. Head for the water to kayak or stand-up paddleboard. After lunch, the ship arrives in **Avalon Harbor**, where you'll have time to explore on your own. Explore downtown Avalon, the island's only incorporated city, with a

population a little under 5,000. Take the 30-minute (mostly uphill) stroll up **Avalon Canyon** to visit the Wrigley Monument and The Botanic Garden. Or visit an architectural gem: the famous Catalina Casino, built by William Wrigley Jr. in 1929. Scuba certified? Our team can arrange diving and gear rental for you with a top local operator. Return to the ship for a farewell dinner and a last evening at sea under the stars. (B, L, D)



DAY Los Angeles / Disembark

5 Awake dockside in the bustling Port of Los Angeles (early risers can catch the action in one of the world's largest ports). Enjoy a final breakfast on board before disembarking-refreshed by your getaway. (B)



Cabins: All cabins face outside with windows or portholes, private facilities and climate controls. Category 4 cabins have step-out balconies.

Public Areas: Global gallery; fitness center; LEXspa; lounge with full service bar and facilities for films and presentations; observation deck; mud room with lockers for expedition gear, and a partially covered sundeck with chairs and tables. Our "open bridge" provides guests an opportunity to meet our officers and captain and learn about navigation.







Main Deck: #312-314, #311-315, #306-308, #305-307 Upper Deck: #224-226, #225-227

CATEGORY 3: Upper Deck #201-206 Cabins feature two lower single beds that can convert to a Queen, a writing desk and two large view windows.

CATEGORY 4: Upper Deck #207-229 Cabins feature two lower single beds that can convert to a Queen, a writing desk, large view window and small, private balcony.

CATEGORY 1: Main Deck #301-306 Cabins feature two lower single beds that can convert to a Queen, a writing desk and two portholes.

CATEGORY 2: Main Deck #307-315 Cabins feature two lower single beds that can convert to a Queen, a writing desk and two portholes.
